It has 10 different fully equipped studios, including ceramics, woodworking, screen-printing, glass, flameworking, jewelry, welding, photography, textiles (sewing, weaving/spinning and dyeing), and arts & crafts. It offers more than 90 classes each quarter, ranging from one-day workshops to seven-week courses. Its classes are small so you get lots of one-on-one attention. After developing a skill, you may purchase a day or quarter pass to use the studios whenever our classes are not in session.

Open to UC Davis students only, the Paloozas are a great chance for students to make handcrafted gifts for friends or family. Projects will be set up throughout the facility, and students can choose which projects they would like to complete. Projects range in price from \$1 to \$12.
- Annual Staff Show and Auction—Every year in November/December, the auction features over 100 beautiful handcrafted items for sale. Jewelry, ceramics, glass, wood, metal, photography, textiles and more are included in the auction. Anyone can place silent bids during the month the show is on display. Then, in early December, final bidding is held on a Friday evening beginning at 6 pm.

Intramural Sports

About Us: Campus Recreation's IM Sports program provides students, faculty, staff, and alumni with the opportunity to participate in a variety of competitive and recreational sports activities. IM Sports offers more than 25 different activities (men's, women's, and CoRec) in traditional and nontraditional activities. IM Sports also presents tournaments and leagues for individuals and two-person teams in such activities as badminton, racquetball, and tennis.

Leagues are generally four weeks long, with every team playing one game per week. Teams are then ranked based on record, FairPlay, and rating score and seeded in a playoff bracket. The playoffs last one to three weeks and result in one league champion.

Tournaments are typically short-term events ranging from one day to two days with each team guaranteed a minimum of two games during round robin play. Teams are then ranked based on their record and rating score, and seeded in a playoff bracket accordingly. Playoffs continue throughout the day or conclude the following day, resulting in one league champion.

Leagues are separated by season. Fall leagues include: flag football (7v7), floor hockey, soccer (9v9), tennis (singles), ultimate frisbee, and volleyball. Winter leagues include: basketball, indoor soccer, racquetball. Spring leagues include: flag football (4v4), grass volleyball (4v4), innertube water polo, soccer (7v7), softball, tennis (doubles), ultimate frisbee, wiffleball, outdoor basketball (3v3), and golf. Summer leagues include: softball, ultimate frisbee.

Tournaments include: badminton, golf, and handball, dodgeball, poker, and table tennis.

Campus Violence Prevention Program

About Us: The CVPP unit of the UC Davis Police Department explores myths and exposes the realities of sexual violence, relationship violence, and hate related activity, focusing on prevention through education. The program's primary mission is to eliminate these forms of violence and in the interim, to ensure support services are available for survivors. The program is committed to the advancement of services available to survivors through prevention, intervention, education, training, and policy.

Student Events:

The UC Davis Campus Violence Prevention Program, a component of the University Police Department, is dedicated to reducing the incidence of sexual assault, relationship violence and stalking in the campus community. Our role in reducing violence is multi-faceted: we work to increase campus safety, to broaden public awareness about the nature of rape and its impact on men and women, and to mitigate the trauma of the victim/survivor. We serve the students, faculty, staff and neighbors of the University, including UCDMC in Sacramento. Our philosophy is that through education we can prevent the reduce violence against women. Our victim services include 24-hour crisis intervention and advocacy.

This advocacy includes:

- Hospital, law enforcement, and/or court accompaniment
- Advocacy for academic assistance
- Referrals to on-campus and community resources

Our staff consists of one full-time coordinator, one full-time assistant coordinator, one full-time victim advocate, as well as approximately 20 student assistants. Together, we provide a wide variety of programs and services designed to reduce risk and to inform the University community about the resources available for dealing with sexual assault, relationship violence and its aftermath. Our educational programs, tailored to meet the needs of individual audiences, include films, discussion groups, lectures, role-plays, and communication exercises. We provide programs to the many UCD and local community groups, including residence halls, sororities, fraternities, staff, athletic teams, student clubs and academic courses.

- Acquaintance Rape Education and Risk Reduction
- Personal Safety & Prevention Techniques
- Dating / Domestic Violence
- Stalking

RAD - Rape Aggression Defense

The Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.) program offers women a comprehensive self-defense experience, which focuses on risk reduction strategies and physical defense techniques. The course culminates with a simulated attack by a mock aggressor, during which the student will have the opportunity to test their new skills. There are self-defense classes offered every quarter, contact CVPP to find out further information about RAD or to sign up for a class.

- **Professional Staff:** CAPS is a multi-culturally and educationally diverse group of experienced psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers, pre- and post-doctoral interns, and peer counselors.

What CAPs Provides:

- **Behavioral Health Clinic:** Located at Cowell Student Health Center, students who need assistance in coping with stress-related physical concerns and health problems can be referred by their providers at Cowell Student Health Center or CAPS.
- **Eating Disorder Management Team:** The EDMT, a collaboration between CAPS and Cowell Student Health, facilitates multidisciplinary assessment, education, and non-intensive, outpatient management of students with eating disorders.
- **Stress and Wellness Clinic:** The clinic offers workshops, groups, and one-on-one counseling sessions aimed to provide students with strategies, support, and information to help decrease physical and emotional symptoms of stress, while increasing overall sense of wellness.
- **Applied Sports Psychology Program:** This program assists intercollegiate athletes to enhance athletic performance and cope with personal and academic concerns.
- **Workshops and Programs:** Staff is available to offer a psychological perspective in the planning and implementation of various educational programs (e.g. cross-cultural issues, coping with loss, and communication skills).
- **Consultation:** Professional staff is also available by phone or appointment to offer consultation to students, staff and faculty for help in dealing with students who are experiencing difficulties.

- **Rebuy:** In order to make recycling economically feasible, we must buy recycled products and packaging. When we buy recycled products, we create an economic incentive for recyclable materials to be collected, manufactured, and marketed as new products. Remember, you're not recycling unless you're rebuying.

Students are notified of the hold by checking SISWEB at the time of registration. If you fail to clear your hold during your specified period, you may be unable to make changes to your current registration and to register for future quarters. If you meet with your adviser during this quarter and have your hold released, there should be no difficulties with subsequent registration. You have approximately four months to clear an advising hold.

The way you design the remainder of your studies here at King Hall is largely left to your discretion. However, there are a number of resources available to you when making decisions about your course selection. Please keep these in mind:

- While not required, you should keep in mind the second and third year courses, which cover subjects tested on the California Bar Examination. (Bar courses are listed below).

- You should review the Law School Regulations, which govern your academic life.
- Read through the Course Descriptions for prerequisite information.
- Talk to the Clinical and Externship Coordinator or Prof. Bill Hing; Clinical Director, about clinical opportunities.
- If you are planning to do a Independent Study (Law 499), Advanced Writing Project (Law 419), or participate in an Interschool Competition (Law 413), you must sign up for these units by completing the appropriate form through the Registrar's Office by the fourth week of the semester. These units require a faculty supervisor's signature as well as the approval of the Assistant Dean for Student Affairs.

Counseling Center

- The Counseling Center provides short- term individual counseling to students who wish to explore personal, interpersonal, vocational, or academic concerns. Some of their psychotherapy groups are designed for the specific needs of re-entry and graduate students. The center also offers psychiatric evaluations and medication management on a referral basis.

Program Information The Washington Program offers two programs for undergraduates: an academic program during fall, winter, and spring quarters; and a summer program. Academic Program: students participating during fall, winter and spring quarters earn 15 units of credit. Students enroll in an internship, research seminar, and an upper division elective course.

Although based in Washington, DC, students are registered as full-time students, fulfill university residency requirements, and are eligible for financial assistance. Summer Program: students participating during the summer complete an internship and receive transcript notation, but do not necessarily earn academic credit. Admitted students may choose to earn 7 units of academic credit by enrolling in one course in conjunction with their internship.
